



Using the St Albans Boys School Pool

To ensure a good working relationship with the School we would ask swimmers/parents to observe the following guidelines from the school and club:

- Do not arrive earlier than 15 minutes before your session is due to start. The pupils and staff are on site working and we should not disturb them.
- Please use the Upper Car Park by Abbey Gateway and make your way through the school site to the Pool
- If there are no spaces in the Upper Car Park on a Sunday you will need to look for on street parking. Aquis court can be used for overflow parking on week day evenings but only if the Upper Car park is full.
- Those walking onto site can make their way up the slope past the minibuses to the Centre entrance.
- Those with a valid Disability Parking Badge may use the lower car park , take the first left turn and make their way up the slope to the designated parking bays. Please advise the Centre staff that you have parked there.
- No swimmers should be unsupervised in the Centre lobby. The swimmers are the responsibility of parents until they are poolside. If you are not coming into the building yourself please ensure that your children are in another adults care and in any event ensure a Coach is present before leaving the site.
- Swimmers should not leave any bags/clothing/belongings in the changing room. They should instead take their bag poolside during their sessions to leave space for the next group to use the changing room. The club cannot take any responsibility for belongings that are left in the changing rooms.
- Entrance to the Centre is via the main lobby door – swimmers should not use any other door inadvertently left open.
- Younger siblings must be supervised at all times and particularly if in the corridor outside the balcony area.
- The balcony door must not be propped open as this affects the whole building air conditioning system.
- No pets should be brought onto the school site.

The St Albans Boys School pool is a great facility and we wish to continue using it for a long time – following the schools guidelines helps with this.
